have missed anyone.


Midwest Bonsai Society – June Event

Monthly Care Report - What to do in August

No relaxing yet. Wait until next month. Everything that is healthy is growing robustly. Nearly everything that isn't healthy is getting better.

Mid-July has been hot and dry, so watch your watering daily, especially small trees like mame and/ or shohin. Trees that are sensitive to full sun, like Japanese maples, should be situated in partial shade on hot, sunny afternoons. Don't water foliage if trees are in sun. On super hot days, I spray foliage early in the day, so it dries o before the sun hits. or in the evenings after trees are getting some shade, to help cool them a bit. Midday root watering and a little extra nitrogen will help.

When watering, cover every part thoroughly (leaves, branches, trunk, soil surface). Obtain a wand that produces the effect of soft rain, arching the stream upward so it falls like rain all over the tree. Rewater the soil surface multiple times until you feel it is thoroughly saturated. If the tree is rootbound it will require three or four visits. This is a critical process that ensures old air is completely pushed out the bottom of the container and fresh air is pulled into the soil mass. A plus of this method is that a lot of chlorine is dispersed and added oxygen is mixed into the water.

It's generally too late in the season for digging or repotting except for tropicals, though the more experienced can seemingly get away with almost anything.

Your feeding, pinching, and pruning schedules should be in full swing by now. Pinch terminal buds from deciduous trees, leaving only one pair of leaves, and keep plucking terminal buds off junipers and cedars as well. Prune and trim vigorous growth on deciduous and broad-leaved evergreens. It follows that more trimming yields better ramification.

Continue to fertilize on your established schedule. You want the trees to have energy to produce wood and begin the process if storing energy in the lower trunk and roots for dormancy and next year's growth spurt. Continue to check wires.

After about August 20 begin needle thinning on five-needle pines. If the needles come off easily when you pull them toward the tip you can continue throughout the tree. If there is resistance you risk damaging the bark and endangering the health of the tree. The needles removed must be trimmed/cut off at the middle of the fascicle. This can change in any given tree yearly.

To balance the vigor of the branches on white pines. remove all of last year's growth and about half this year's needles on strong growths. Remove all last this year's needles but leave all of this year's on average strength growths. Leave about half of last years needles and again leave all of this this year's needles on weak growths. When finished tree branches should look like they all have the same needle density. Performing this process for several years will also reduce the length of needles.

Watch for insect pests, but don't overdo it with the chemicals! Always read and follow manufacturers' directions, and be aware that plants in small containers are more easily stressed than plants growing in the ground. If you spray your trees with insecticides or fungicides, it's best to put them into the shade for the rest of the day.

Watch for leaf burn or heat stress from too much afternoon sun. Trees do much better outside, but if they are facing from east to west and are receiving late afternoon sun, the pot and the soil temperature can get extremely high, enough to kill the roots, so give them some shade in late afternoon. Be sure to turn your trees weekly so the sun doesn't pull them to one side. High temper-

atures and humidity are perfect breeding grounds for fungi and mildew. Be vigilant and use a preventive fungicide on trees you have had problems within the past.

With this being the most active growing season it sometimes seems you can't keep up with all the pruning. I let some of my trees grow out a little now to promote healthy roots and help with gaining some trunk size. Now is a good time to let those certain branches grow out to thicken them up. You may do so by letting the branch grow out for the summer and then cut it back. Also, if you have branches that have outgrown your composition, now is a good time to remove them and start growing a new one. To force back budding, keep your growth tips pinched off.

Can't stress enough the need to keep up with watering. If your tree is outside, water daily those that drain fast and are in shallow pots, maybe twice. It would be very hard to overwater a tree sitting outside this time of year. If in doubt whether it needs water, water.
