# Monthly Care Report - What to do in July

July, hot and humid as it is, is a great time of year for bonsai. Growth has slowed, deciduous trees are leafed out, and juniper trees should be bushy. Since it is also vacation time, be sure to plan ahead, even if leaving for a few days. Find a trusty friend or hook up a watering system with a timer. Even when using watering system have someone check to insure it turned on, turned off and that all trees were watered.

Keep your trees in shape by pinching or light pruning. Check wiring on trees. Watch for pests and diseases, and spray accordingly. If you find something wrong and aren't sure what the problem is, consult someone who is knowledgeable, and ask them. Bring trees to monthly meeting and ask for assistance identifying problem. Watch out for scale, looking for tiny white specks on the foliage. Scale requires repeated sprayings regularly,

as it is amazingly persistent. Fertilize regularly. If using fertilizer cakes, replace every month.

#### **JULY WORK**

July, hot and humid as it is, is a great time of year for bonsai. Growth is in full tilt and likely to continue, deciduous trees are leafed out, and juniper trees should be bushy. Keep trimming your trees. Because this July is forecast to be cooler than normal, we should be able to extend our repotting season through July—possibly August and September. Look to take advantage of this longer window to get trees out of depleted mix with room to grow after trimming roots and in the right pot. Since it is also vacation time, be sure to plan ahead, even if leaving for a few days. Find a trusty friend or hook up a watering system with a timer. Even when using watering systems have someone check to insure it turned on, turned off and that all trees were watered.

Keep your trees in shape by all techniques required. Check wiring on trees. Even add some wire when defoliating or new growth is strong and not easily damaged. Watch for pests and diseases, and spray accordingly. If you find something wrong and aren't sure what the problem is, consult someone who is knowledgeable, and ask them.

Note we have added a "Bonsai Helpline" link on our website or you can simply email questions to Midwest Bonsai Society midwest. bonsai@yahoo.com and we will respond. So, if you have questions send them along with photos to get an opinion on what is afflicting your trees. In addition, given our live monthly meetings will be starting up soon, you can always bring tree with you and ask for help identifying a problem.

Watch out for scale, looking for tiny white specks on the foliage. Scale requires repeated sprayings regularly,

as it is amazingly persistent. Adding paraffin based horticultural oil or Neem oil to the insecticide makes it much more effective. Fertilize regularly. If using fertilizer cakes, replace every month.

Turn your trees often so that all sides get equal amounts of sunlight and grow in all directions, (turn 90 degrees clockwise each week). The hot sun can heat up pots and the soil, trees in wide rimmed pots tend to get hotter. To prevent heat damage to roots cover soil and the rims of your pots with sphagnum moss, old cloth or burlap. This will also help keep the plants moist longer. Another technique that works well, which I learned from Kav Berlenborn, is to use foam shelf liners which will cool and reflect light to increase growth and let in water and air freely. —Ivan Watters 07/2020

## Bonsai 101 The Rules of Bonsai

#### Branches:

- **1.** No crossing branches, or branches that cross the trunk.
- **2.** No eye-poking branches (pointed directly at viewer).
- **3.** First branch should be placed approximately one third the height of the tree.
- **4.** Succeeding branches placed at one third the remaining distance to the top of the tree.
- **5.** Branches go on the outside of the curves (No belly branches).

- **6.** Branch caliper should be in proportion to the trunk. Branches that are thicker than one third the trunk caliper will be too thick.
- 7. First branch should be left (or right), second branch right (or left), third branch should be back branch.
- **8.** Branches should visually alternate, no parallel branches.
- **9.** Branches should diminish in size and caliper as they ascend.
- 10. There should be space

between the branches to 'Let the birds fly through'.

- **11.** First and second branches (Left and Right branches) should be placed forward of the mid line to 'invite' the viewer.
- **12.** First, second, and third branches are approximate 120 degrees apart, with the back branch not directly behind the tree.
- **13.** Only one branch per trunk position, no 'wheel and spoke' or whorled branches, or bar branches (branches directly opposite each other).
- **14.** Branches should create an outline of a scalene triangle with the apex representing

God, the middle corner man and the lower corner earth.

- 15. Secondary branches should alternate left and right and follow the rules of main branch placement, except there should be no secondary branches moving up or down. This creates the foliage pad.
- **16.** To create the illusion of an old tree, wire the branches down. Young trees have ascending branches. The branches near and in the apex can be horizontal or ascend since this is the young part of the tree.
- 17. Branches for cascades

## Rules of Bonsai (continued from page 3)

generally follow the rules for uprights, except that the trunk moves down.

**18.** In twin trees, there should not be branches between the trees which would cross the trunks. The outside branches of both trees create the triangle of foliage.

**19.** A jin should not be hidden in foliage.

The main branches are arranged left, back (rear) and right (or right-back-left) in ascending order starting from the bottom portion of the trunk approximately one-third of the height of the tree. The thickness of the main branches should be proportionate to the

size of the trunk and separated vertically with equal or nearly equal distances. The first branches to the left and right of the tree should be slightly forward as if the tree wishes to embrace the viewer.

Viewed from the top, the tips of the three main branches should form a triangle with unequal sides (scalene) when connected by lines. The first back branch should be arranged slightly to the right or left so that it is partly visible to the viewer.

This triangular arrangement of the branches continues as the tree rises to create a spiral of higher, shorter and thinner branches. If the trunk is curved, as in the informal upright style, the branches should emerge from outside of the curve. The apex should be treated as a small bonsai.

There should be slightly fewer branches at the front than at the back so that the viewer will have good impression of depth and perspective. No branch crosses another, nor points to the viewer (we call such branch "eye-poker"). The branches should likewise taper gradually towards the tip with texture proportionate to that of the trunk.

The heavier branches should drop toward the horizontal just like those of old trees because of their heavy load and the pull of gravity. The extent of drop differs with species.

Note: A negative space or

"gap", that part of the trunk without a branch when it should have one, may be considered positively as a gift and incorporated into the design of the tree to give it a natural effect. It will be as if the tree itself made the decision.

Secondary branches or twigs emerging from the sides of branches should be arranged in alternate pattern. It minimizes symmetry and allows gradual taper of the branch. Opposite twigs (or bar branches) tend to constrict the development of the branch. Bark, texture, and sizes of twigs should also be proportionate with branches.
