## Monthly Care Report:

What to Do in May

By May, most deciduous trees have come into leaf and new candles on pines have sprouted. Feeding, pinching, watering, and pruning schedules should be in full swing by now. Watering should now be done routinely. Cuttings of evergreens may still be taken. Air layering of deciduous and evergreens can be continued. Pinch back long shoots of deciduous trees, as late frosts can damage young leaves.

Candles on pines can

be pinched any time as they elongate. Start with weak buds and do strong buds a week or so later. Spruce, juniper and larch shoots are probably ready for their first pinching of the season. Watch new growth on your deciduous trees and trim back to 1-2 pairs of leaves. It is critical to stay on top of maples now and pinch out the center bud as it emerges from the middle of the first two leaves. Watch wired branches carefully to avoid unsightly spiral scars

from bark growing over wires—deciduous trees in particular can expand very quickly in May and June.

May is not too late for repotting or field collecting, but this requires increasingly careful after-care as the season progresses. Trees repotted or collected in May should be protected from strong sun and wind until strong growth is observed, as leafy trees may suffer from transplant shock, so roots should be left intact as much as possible. Finish repotting pines early in the month. Remember to keep them in the shade for a few

weeks. Trees repotted in April can be given light doses of fertilizer.

Continue to patrol for insects, and adjust watering to match warmer weather. Careful use of insecticides and fungicides becomes increasingly useful at this time of year. Always read and follow manufacturer's directions, but keep in mind that trees in containers may do better with slightly diluted formulations.

I think Bonsai Tonight may be the best free online resource out there (not that I know many of them). If you go to the blog site, you will find loads of articles written about just about everything. An email is typically sent to you every 3 to 7 days of the latest posting so that you don't even have to go to the website. However, I suggest that you do for an index of past topics. The expanse of topics is too great to cover here.

## Bonsai Empire (Paid Online Courses) https://www.bonsaiempire.com/

While there is a blog and some free information on this website (not as good as the two previous resources), the meat and potatoes are the online courses, which I think are fantastic. The courses range from beginner to intermediate to advanced levels, and then there are special courses related to specific types of trees, i.e., deciduous or coniferous bonsai trees at the intermediate level.

What's very nice about this site is that when you purchase a class, it's yours for as long as Bonsai Empire is in existence. You just login and watch your class(es) as often as you would like. There is not an annual subscription; it's a one time course fee. Course fees range from \$15 to \$30 for beginners and \$50 to \$70 for intermediate and advanced levels. Time commitment involved is 1-1.5 hours for each beginner course to between 2 and 10 hours per course for the intermediate and advanced levels. The classes are taught by a number of different world-famous artists. I've gotten through most of the classes, and I can say firsthand that the classes are a real worthwhile bargain. Since I have purchased most of the classes, when a new class is offered, I typically get a something like a 30% discount on it (if I act quickly enough).

## Eisei-En Bonsai-U (Online Donation for classes) by Bjorn Bjorholm http://bjornbjorholm.com/bonsai-u/

I believe that there are 8 classes in Bonsai-U. I haven't watched them yet, so maybe you can let us know what you think. I do like Bjorn Bjorholm a lot as I can related well to his instruction. He does a number of video classes through Bonsai Empire, and that's how I know. He also has an Intensive on-site school at his shop in Tennessee. I would like to go there someday. I know one of our members already does and he highly recommends it. You can go to the Eisei-En website to learn more.

Bonsai Mirai (Online Subscription classes) by Ryan Neil

Website: https://www.bonsaimirai.com/ Classes: https://live.bonsaimirai.com/ I'm probably going to get creamed by people for saying what I'm going to say here. Ryan Neil certainly has a lot of fans out there. He's earned it. He's truly an inspirational artist. He's extremely knowledgeable, and I'm impressed with his ability to properly use the English language. However, for my tastes and time availability, there is too much talk going on. The classes are live-streamed if you can watch them on schedule, or he has each of them recorded and cataloged on the site. I would love to get through all of them, but that's an impossibility for me especially with my commitments. The usual weekly sessions can last 2 hours or more. There are many videos that take much less time. My difficulty is that there needs to be a balance between time, talk and action. Too much time is taken talking during actions that could be reduced in time...but they can't be reduced because much of this is live-streamed. It would take significant amounts of editing to reduce the time in these streams for watching them as videos later.

The other thing that I don't like is that you can't pay for a class and 'own' it like you do with Bonsai Empire. You have to keep subscribing if you want to watch a particular class again...which I often do. Pricing is \$18/month for the Standard Level and \$30/month for the Pro Level. I'll let you go to the website to see the benefits of both.

Ryan provides great information and insights in these classes. Many people really prefer the way they are now. Personally, I need them more streamlined. Honest opinion, folks. That's why I'm paid the big bucks for this job. I do subscribe to the Standard Level, I watch whenever I can (or go back to oldies when I need to know how to do something), and I think that's fine for the vast majority of us.
