May Exhibit Update

Our May Exhibit is quickly approaching and I wanted to make you aware of the activities we have planned. World renowned carving artist, Will Baddeley, will be in the US



from the UK, and the Midwest Bonsai Society is sharing expenses to bring him in to

> our Show. He will be doing an all-day carving workshop on Saturday, May 13. This will be a Bring Your Own Tree workshop. The fee for the combined sessions is \$180 (total) and limited to 8 students. There will also be availability for 4 individuals for each session to audit the class (no questions or discussion) for \$25/session. Lunch will be available for those who sign up for the 2-session class.

> Mr. Baddeley will also be doing a Bring Your Own Tree styling workshop on Sunday, May 14 for \$75 in the morning session.

He will be doing a demonstration (free) on Sunday afternoon.

BC Bonsai will also be doing a Saturday morning workshop on Boulevard Cypress trees, and a Sunday morning workshop on Dwarf Alberta Spruce trees. Both classes carry \$20 material + \$50 registration fees. We will also have vendors and promising bonsai material on display, along with ongoing demonstrations by our club members.

Monthly Care Report -What to Do in May

By May, most deciduous trees have come into leaf and new candles on pines have sprouted. Feeding, pinching, watering, and pruning schedules should be in full swing by now. Watering should now be done routinely. Cuttings of evergreens may still be taken. Air layering of deciduous and evergreens can be continued. Pinch back long shoots of deciduous trees, as late frosts can damage young leaves.

May is not too late for repotting or field collecting, but this requires increasingly careful after-care as the season progresses. Trees repotted or collected in May should be protected from strong sun and wind until strong growth is observed, as leafy trees may su er from transplant shock, so roots should be left intact as much as possible. Finish repotting pines early in the month. Remember to keep them in the shade for a few weeks. Trees repotted in April can be given light doses of fertilizer.

Larches are past the time we can do anything other

than pluck the tips. Fingers are best. You must be very careful not to cut into individual needles as they will turn brown.

Junipers can be thinned carefully with scissors. Cut out all long, spindly, vigorous growth. Cedar Apple Rust is very bad this year because of the cold and wet season. Treat with sprayed on fungicide. Systemic is best. Continue monthly treatments until the trees go into storage in fall.

Pines, Spruces, Firs, Yews and Hinoki Cypress continue to de-candle, pluck or pinch new growth as it develops. You will need to do this with Yews a few times. Pines need special techniques that are different for 2-3 needle and 5 needle species. Watch professional bonsai growers on YouTube or get Stone Lantern's book on Pines. Or find someone knowledgeable to show you. 2-3 needle pines require the most work. 5 needle pines are less. I think the beauty of these trees is worth the effort.

Deciduous—Broadleaf Evergreen. Continue

trimming, defoliation and major pruning. Watch new growth on your deciduous trees and trim back to 1-2 pairs of leaves. It is critical to stay on top of maples now and pinch out the center bud as it emerges from the middle of the first two leaves. Watch wired branches carefully to avoid unsightly spiral scars from bark growing over wires-deciduous trees in particular can expand very quickly in May and June.

Tropicals. Your trees can go outside now if night temps below 50 are not forecast. Be prepared to dance the Bonsai Tango, if forecast changes and temps are expected to dip below 50. You may begin to feed now. Use time release or High Nitrogen fertilizer.

Fertilizer. A brief note if you are using low Nitrogen fertilizer, keep it up until about 6/15 then switch to higher N. If you want to use time-release now is the time to begin.

Water routinely if we don't get enough rain. Spring and early summer are usually the worst for drying out trees. Do not be fooled, check your trees daily... an old Japanese saying; "Never count on Buddha to water your bonsai."

Insects. Check daily for any insect problems. Aphids love spring growth and can get out of hand before vou know it. Look for scale on the underside of the leaves. Soapy water can usually take care of both those problems but is only a temporary relief. Check all your tropicals, deciduous and broadleaf evergreens for Thrips (folding in of the leaves) if they have been a problem in the past. Check your Junipers for mites. We use a granular systemic insecticide whose main ingredient is Imidacloprid, a neonicotinoid pesticide, available at some nurseries or garden centers. This kills almost all insects and is highly toxic to honeybees, birds and fish. (See University of Florida IFAS Extension, EDIS). Careful use of insecticides and fungicides becomes increasingly useful at this time of year. Always read and follow manufacturer's directions. Don't use less because it may not be effective. Don't use more because it may cause damage or death.

Children's Tree Styling:


We will need a members on Saturday and Sunday afternoon to assist with potting and watering styled miniature trees. We will also need one or possibly two members who are willing to assist in styling.
