MVP Volunteers for Successful August Exhibition

We sincerely hope most of our members were able to come and enjoy the Exhibition. We certainly want to thank all our members that volunteered their time as the show cannot happen without your participation. It is amazing how many volunteers are required. Remember working as a volunteer provides a unique view of "backstage" at the Exhibition and how the general public is fascinated by the art of Bonsai.

In my opinion, far and away our MVP volunteer team members for the show are Larry Stephens, Amy Wright and Robert Wright. All three of these MBS members were at the Garden or working on logistics of the exhibition starting at 3:00pm on Wednesday August 18th and continuing every day (arriving before the show opened and leaving after it closed), until after 8:00pm on Sunday August 22nd. This means every other volunteer during the entire show worked with at least one of these members. I know when I have a question or need direction

this is the crew that is there, with the answers.

In fact, as Vice President of Special Events Larry began working with vendors for the this exhibition months ago. By March he had commitments from vendors for our August Exhibition. This year we had 22 vendors. Working with the Chicago Botanic Gardens staff he determines the number of tables that need to be rented, provided courtyard layout for vendor tables and ordered catering for vendor's and volunteer's lunches on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. He also rented space at the Heller Nature Center, purchased plates, cups etc., and planned food order for Saturday night's Dinner Auction.

On the Wednesday before the show Larry arranges courtyard tables for vendors and hangs their signs. Amy and Robert rent a truck and meet volunteers at our storage garage in Glenview to load up our club merchandise (t-shirts, aprons etc.), exhibition signs, supplies, miscellaneous equip-

ment and most challenging the disassembled Tokonoma.

Thursday 7:30 AM Amy and Robert arrived at Chicago Botanic Garden with rental truck. Larry arrived at about the same time, after stopping to grab donuts and coffee for volunteers. Larry 's initial focus was on working with vendors setting up their booths. This is everything from vendors requests for an additional table to getting volunteers to help vendors unload and showing them where to stage workshop trees.

Amy and Robert worked with volunteers to unload the truck. Then Robert and Larry worked with volunteers to set up Nichols Hall including tree display tables with Shoji Screens between them, installing lifts to raise tables on the perimeter, installing tablecloths and skirting. They also, assembled the Tokonoma and Mame display cases.

Amy focused on setting up Burnstein hall including sales tables for club merchandise, educational boards and workshop tree logistics. From 3:00 to 8:00 Robert and Amy handled tree registration and coordinated positioning of trees on tables. They even brought their printer from home to print tree registration placards.

Friday this trio again arrived around 7:30 when judging began. Robert and Amy assisted with collecting judge's sheets and tabulating results. They, with volunteers distributed ribbons and trophies and moved Best of Show trees to Tokonoma. Robert for the past few years has also been shooting video of Judges Critique that is held from 5:00 to 7:00.

When show opened at noon on Friday until it closed at 5:00 on Sunday one of them (usually Robert) could be found at the Information Table in Nichols Hall answering questions and selling raffle tickets. Robert also watered trees, without damaging stands (that should have been waxed by owners to prevent damage but often weren't). Larry was usu-

Monthly Care Report - What to do in October

General Care: Pay particular attention to watering right now as temperatures fluctuate. Do not water by schedule!!! Check your soil/pots and water accordingly! Colder temperatures or cloudy days, generally require less watering. However, roots will remain active, so proper watering is still crucial. Light levels are changing and leaves/needles are turning yellow as is normal for this time of the year. Fertilize all of your trees generously with low-nitrogen (Low N - High P - High K) fertilizer through to the end of October or until you bring them indoors. Chemical fertilizers (in lieu of organic) may be best at this time. CHECK YOUR WIRE to make sure it's not biting in since branches (and trunks on smaller trees) have been gaining their greatest volume over the last month and will continue into October.

Now is also a good time to spray an insecticide/fungicide on your trees before bringing them in for protection. I typically use Bayer 3-in-1 Insect, Disease & Mite Control along with Neem Oil (separate product). Put the correct dosage of Neem Oil into warm water first, and then add the Bayer 3-in-1. Avoid spraying Jades/

Portulacaria and Buttonwoods with Neem Oil. If Neem oil application on Ficus is too thick, it will drop leaves. Don't use a systemic insecticide (the 2-in-1 granular placed in the soil) for killing insects with Serissas or Elms; use the spray.

Indoor Trees: Move your tropical (indoor) trees inside under grow lights. Nighttime temperatures are now typically between 40 and 50 degrees. Clean any debris from the soil and any dead leaves/branches from the trees before bringing them in and spray with insecticide/fungicide if you haven't already. Pay close attention to your soil as you may not need to water as much shortly after the trees are brought indoors. Once the heat in your house is back on, you will need to check for dry soil more frequently. Continue fertilization assuming the trees will be receiving 12-18 hours of light daily and will continue to grow. Some people opt not to fertilize at all (and adjust their lighting accordingly) during the winter so as to avoid long leggy growth. Such growth will occur if you are not providing enough light but will be exacerbated if you are fertilizing and not providing enough light. All species

are a little different, so adjust your watering, fertilizing and light accordingly. Light pruning may be performed if long internodes occur. Wiring may be done, but reporting should be avoided unless there is an emergency. If you must repot, use a heating pad set at ~80 degrees below the pot until the tree recovers.

NOTE: Some species like pomegranates, Chinese sweet plums, Japanese silverberry and olive trees like some cold weather before being brought indoors for the winter. It's generally alright to leave these trees out for several frosts before bringing them in. Avoid leaving them out for hard freezes.

Whether there is a frost or a freeze is dependent upon the amount of water in the air. A frost is when there is a visible frost. A freeze is when the air temperature drops below freezing. Often frost occurs when the temperature is above freezing; however, there can also be a freeze without frost.

Outdoor Trees: Continue fertilizing per above through October but look to stop around mid-November depending upon forecasted temperatures. You want to stop fertilizing ahead of the first freeze. On pines, remove old needles (those that haven't grown this season) so that more light can get between branches to activate

dormant buds. On broadleaf trees, begin removing dead leaves to prevent critters and fungus from enjoying excess moisture. Treat branch and trunk deadwood with jin seal (properly diluted if product requires).

Remove air-layers from your hardy trees if they have roots. If they do not have roots, it's a judgment call as to whether or not you continue with the air-layer. Either way, the air-layer remaining on the tree or the separated air-layer with roots need to be kept cold (around 35 degrees), but they *must* be protected from freezing.

You should be making your final arrangements now as to how you will protect your trees through the winter so that you aren't caught off guard by early freezes. Some options include unheated garages, crawl spacing, cold greenhouses and even outdoors with roots protected under a mulch bed. Seek additional sources to check your intended setup. Keep the trees outdoors for two or three frosts. Do not bring them indoors! Light pruning may still be performed through October. Repotting may be performed only in emergency situations. Avoid cutting any more roots than necessary and keep them well-protected if emergency repotting has been done.

Again, all the work described above is done as a labor of love by these MVPs assisted by all of our other volunteers. When asked why they dedicate so much time and effort, their response is that this is the signature event of Midwest Bonsai Society. This is their fa-

vorite part of what are society provides to our members and the public at large.

We all can show our appreciation for their efforts not just with a "Thank You" but by volunteering a little more our own time to assist in putting on the Exhibition next year. While we had great support for the bulk of the items needed for the show we could have used a few more volunteers Saturday afternoon and Sunday, including for the tear down of the Exhibition. This will this make their favorite event even more enjoyable.
