It is September already! Now is the time to start planning for winter storage of your trees. My tropical tress love the grow lights I got from Home Depot. The hardy trees will go to their usual spot in the garage. Make sure you have a couple of good frosts before you bring the hardy ones in. You want to make sure they are going dormant for the winter. Even during the winter all the trees will need regular watering if you have them

inside and the tropical will want to be fertilized on a routine basis too.

So, what have I learned this year? I learned that we can pick up some good tips from our vendors. Diane Valavanis made some comments during a sale about how often we should fertilize tropical trees. It was more frequent than I had been doing. Super Fly Bonsai persuaded me to try spraying leaves with 2-0-6 Kelp mixed in the

water. Wow, my trees have responded well to both changes.

WHAT'S COMING UP? October 3rd is the General meeting, is focused on Azaleas with visiting artist David Kreutz of Satsuki Bonsai-en in St Louis. # **Monthly Care Report - October**

General Care: Pay particular attention to watering right now as temperatures fluctuate. Do not water by schedule!!! Check your soil/pots and water accordingly! Colder temperatures or cloudy days, generally require less watering. However, roots will remain active, so proper watering is still crucial. Light levels are changing and leaves/ needles are turning yellow as is normal for this time of the year. Fertilize all of your trees generously with low-nitrogen (Low N - High P - High K) fertilizer through to the end of October or until you bring them indoors. Chemical fertilizers (in lieu of organic) may be best at this time. CHECK YOUR WIRE to make sure it's not biting in since branches (and trunks on smaller trees) have been gaining their greatest volume over the last month and will continue into October.

Now is also a good time to spray an insecticide/ fungicide on your trees before bringing them in for protection. I typically use Bayer 3-in-1 Insect, Disease & Mite Control along with Neem Oil (separate product). Put the correct dosage of Neem Oil into warm water first, and then add the Bayer 3-in-1. Avoid spraying Jades/Portulacaria and Buttonwoods with Neem Oil. If Neem oil application on Ficus is too thick, it will drop leaves. Don't use a systemic insecticide (the 2-in-1 granular placed in the soil) for killing insects with Serissas or Elms; use the spray.

**Indoor Trees:** Move your tropical (indoor) trees inside under grow lights. Nighttime temperatures are now typically between 40 and 50 degrees. Clean any debris from the soil and any dead leaves/ branches from the trees before bringing them in and spray with insecticide/ fungicide if you haven't already. Pay close attention to your soil as you may not need to water as much shortly after the trees are brought indoors. Once the heat in your house is back on, you will need to check for dry soil more frequently. Continue fertilization assuming the trees will be receiving 12-18 hours of light daily and will continue to grow. Some people opt not to fertilize at all (and adjust their lighting accordingly) during the winter so as to avoid long leggy growth. Such growth will occur if you are not providing enough light but will be exacerbated if you are fertilizing and not providing enough light. All species are a little different, so adjust your watering, fertilizing and light accordingly. Light pruning may be performed if long internodes occur. Wiring may be done, but repotting should be avoided unless there is an emergency. If you must repot, use a heating pad set at ~80 degrees below the pot until the tree recovers.

**NOTE:** Some species like pomegranates, Chinese sweet plums, Japanese silverberry and olive trees like some cold weather before being brought

indoors for the winter. It's generally alright to leave these trees out for several frosts before bringing them in. Avoid leaving them out for hard freezes.

Whether there is a frost or a freeze is dependent upon the amount of water in the air. A frost is when there is a visible frost. A freeze is when the air temperature drops below freezing. Often frost occurs when the temperature is above freezing; however, there can also be a freeze without frost.

Outdoor Trees: Continue fertilizing per above through October but look to stop around mid-November depending upon forecasted temperatures. You want to stop fertilizing ahead of the first freeze. On pines, remove old needles (those that haven't grown this season) so that more light can get between branches to activate dormant buds. On broadleaf trees, begin removing dead leaves to prevent critters and fungus from enjoying excess moisture. Treat branch and trunk deadwood with iin seal (properly diluted if product requires)

Remove air-layers from your hardy trees if they have roots. If they do not have roots, it's a judgment call as to whether or not you continue with the air-layer. Either way, the air-layer remaining on the tree or the separated air-layer with roots need to be kept cold (around 35 degrees), but they must be protected from freezing.

You should be making your final arrangements now as to how you will protect your trees through the winter so that you aren't caught off guard by early freezes. Some options include unheated garages, crawl spacing, cold greenhouses and even outdoors with roots protected under a mulch bed. Seek additional sources to check your intended setup. Keep the trees outdoors for two or three frosts. Do not bring them indoors! Light pruning may still be performed through October. Repotting may be performed only in emergency situations. Avoid cutting any more roots than necessary and keep them well-protected if emergency repotting has been done.
